

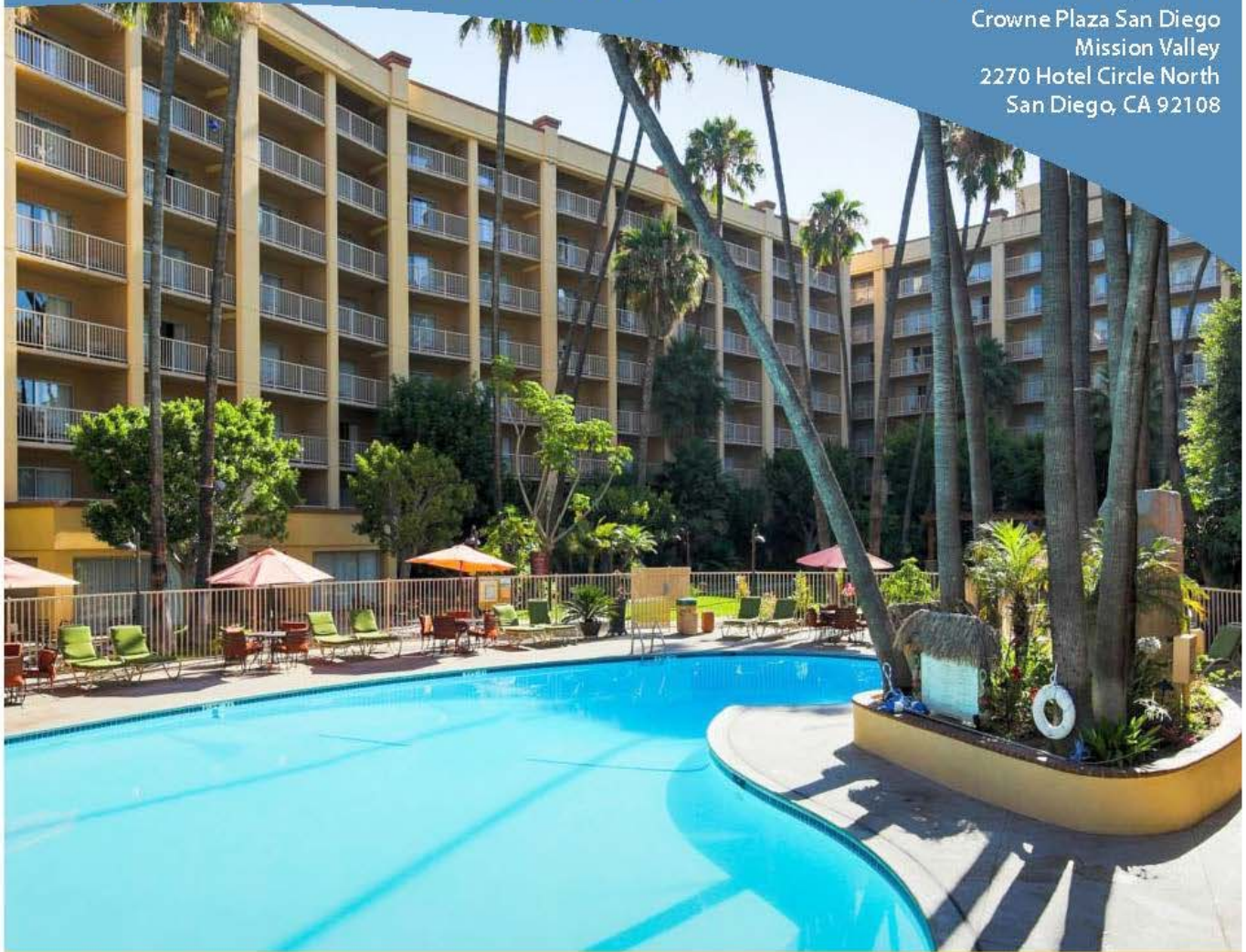

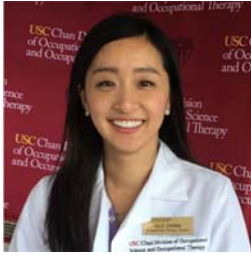
Session 70 – March 20, 2016 – 1:30pm – 3:00pm

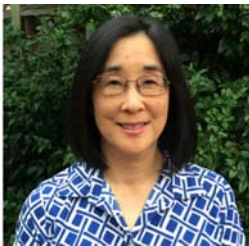
for individuals with neurological conditions. She is currently serving as the vice president of the Nevada Occupational Therapy Association.
