Symposium Presenters

Patricia Bowyer, EdD, MS, OTR/L (TX), FAOTA

Patricia 'Patty' Bowyer has more than 20 years of experience as a clinician and researcher and is a professor at Texas Woman's University-Houston. A focus of her research is the application of an occupation conceptual practice model in oncology practice. This research stems from post-doctoral work that focused on breast cancer fatigue and intervention/assessment development for occupational therapy. In 2011 she began a research project which examined the impact of clinical reasoning and intervention selection with occupational therapy practitioners at a cancer care facility. This project led to current research focus on using a remotivation intervention with breast cancer patients experiencing lymphedema and clinical reasoning in occupational therapy practitioners with cancer patients after post-professional continuing education training. Bowyer is currently developing a study that aims to create a manualized, systematic telehealth program for the cancer caregiver population, which will be accessible to those living in rural areas. The aim is to enhance the overall wellness and quality of life for cancer caregivers.



Kelley R. Covington, MS, ACSM-CET, CEP

Kelley R. Covington was trained in exercise physiology at Appalachian State University and Colorado State University. She is currently completing her PhD in the Occupational Therapy Department at Colorado State University and serves as manager for research and education for Select Medical's ReVital Cancer Rehabilitation Program.



As a certified clinical exercise physiologist (CEP) and cancer exercise trainer (CET), Covington has worked to support individuals with cancer and other chronic health conditions in various community-based and academic clinical settings. In 2017, she co-founded the Fitness Therapy (Fit) for Cancer Program, an ongoing community-based exercise program for cancer survivors at Colorado State University.

The focus of her research is the implementation and effectiveness of cancer rehabilitation and community-based exercise programs. She seeks to enhance survivorship care by integrating cancer rehabilitation and exercise into routine oncology care and demonstrating the real-world value of cancer rehabilitation and exercise services for value-based care outcomes. For her dissertation work, Covington is leading the development of the Exercise in Cancer Evaluation and Decision Support (EXCEDS) algorithm.

Vinita Khanna, MPH, LCSW

Vinita Khanna is the manager of clinical social work at USC Norris Cancer Hospital and supports Keck Medical Center. She is a licensed clinical social worker with more than 14 years of experience in hematology and bone marrow transplantation. Khanna previously worked at City of Hope National Medical Center for seven years. She later began working in the hematology and bone marrow transplant center at USC's Norris Comprehensive Cancer Center with a passion for palliative care and transplant. Khanna focuses on direct clinical care, supervision, quality improvement, research, and macro projects within the hospital and the management of her care coordination team. She also serves on the education and clinical social work committees for Be the Match and the National Bone Marrow Donor Program.



Asfia Mohammed, MOT, OTR/L (TX)

Asfia Mohammed is a senior occupational therapy practitioner at MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, TX. She has been with MD Anderson for eight years and works primarily with surgical and hematological cancer survivors. She is passionate about mentoring and program development and has developed multiple programs to address mental health, body image impairments, and sexuality in the acute inpatient setting.



Robin Newman, OTD, OTR/L (IL), CLT, FAOTA

Robin Newman is a clinical assistant professor in the Department of Occupational Therapy at Boston University College of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences: Sargent College. She has worked with survivors of cancer since 2000. Her clinical and research interests include developing self-management interventions for cancer survivors, focusing on the late effects of cancer treatments and their impact on occupational performance and participation in life roles. She received a Manual Lymph Drainage and Complete Decongestive Therapy certification from Klose Norton Training and Consulting in 2002. She is co-chair of the ACRM Oncology Rehabilitation Task Force. Newman has authored many articles in reviewed journals and has presented at conferences, nationally and internationally, on topics related to occupational therapy and cancer rehabilitation. In 2020, she co-edited a textbook entitled: Cancer and Occupational Therapy: Enabling performance and participation for cancer across the lifespan.



Sherry M. Hite, MOT, OTR/L, Chair, OTAC Professional Development and Leadership Committee

Sherry Hite is the Occupational Therapy Department manager at City of Hope Comprehensive Cancer Center. She serves on the Cognitive Rehabilitation Task Force for the American Congress of Rehabilitation Medicine and has presented at state and national levels on topics including cancer related cognitive impairments, comprehensive breast cancer rehabilitation, and addressing sexuality concerns in oncology. Her current research areas include the use of prehabilitation in surgical oncology, improving multidisciplinary geriatric oncology care, and the use of telemedicine in a breast cancer-recovery program.
