How Occupational Therapy Practitioners Can Center Humanity at End of Life (1 PDU)

What is most important to people and their circle of care at end of life? This time can often feel fraught with uncertainty, difficult decisions, an upending of familiar roles, and perhaps an iterative search for meaning for all involved. There is so much that we, as occupational therapy practitioners, can do to ensure this time is meaningful and the humanity of our patients is centered so their wishes are heard, cared for, and honored right up until the end. Join us for this important discussion on what it means to honor autonomy of the dying as a true form of client-centered care at end of life.

Erika Lim, MS, OTR/L, is an occupational therapy practitioner and end of life doula in Los Angeles, CA. While she finds end of life a ripe time for unearthing love, meaning, and peace, she is most fascinated by the rich learnings of the life and death cycles that happen in our everyday lives. If we approach death with curiosity, it can reveal truths to us about how we want to live. Lim completed a master's in occupational therapy from the University of Southern California (USC) in 2018. In 2020, she became trained as a death midwife with the Sacred Crossings Institute, and in 2025, she became an INELDA certified end of life doula and has joined INELDA as an educator. In 2024, Lim completed the Abion therapy practitioner program at the Kailukuan School of Indigenous Science infusing indigenous knowledge into her work as an occupational therapy practitioner and end of life doula.
