Her work in curriculum and course development aims to center the student's voice and honor the student experience by involving students as partners in their learning and professional growth. In her teaching, Dulek aims to inspire her students to deliver holistic, client-centered, occupation-based therapy through creativity, networking, and lifelong learning.



Michelle Gorenberg, OTD, OTR/L (PA), has been an occupational therapy practitioner for almost 40 years, specializing in children's mental health. She has also been an occupational

therapy educator for the past 15 years. Having recently retired from her full-time academic appointment as an associate professor at Widener University, Gorenberg currently mentors new faculty, serves as an adjunct faculty member, and consults on the curriculum at Widener University. She holds an MS in occupational therapy from Tufts University, a post-professional OTD, and a certificate in Teaching in the Digital Age from Thomas Jefferson University. Gorenberg's teaching practices center on creating inclusive learning communities that support students' curiosity, risktaking, and growth. Her scholarship interests align with her occupational therapy (OT) practice and teaching, including therapeutic use of self in OT, children's mental health, and inclusive teaching practices in higher education. In April 2023, Gorenberg was honored to receive the AOTA Distinguished Educator Award.



Sabrina Gowette, OTD, OTR/L (NV), CBIS, holds an Occupational Therapy Doctorate (OTD) from Touro University Nevada. She is a Certified Brain Injury Specialist (CBIS) by the Brain Injury Association of America.

Gowette currently holds the role of director of fieldwork education and assistant professor at Hawai'i Pacific University's OTD program in Las Vegas, where she teaches topics such as psychosocial and community practice and fieldwork-related courses.

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Grace V. Perry, OTD, OTR/L, is an occupational therapy practitioner for Kaweah Health Rehabilitation Hospital in Visalia, CA. She treats adult clients with a variety of neuromuscular and physical impairments, including spinal cord injury, post-stroke,

amputation, and traumatic brain injury. She earned a post-professional doctorate in August 2023 from Creighton University and a master's in 2015 from East Carolina University. Perry's research interests include technology, clinical education, functional cognition, and chronic disease management.



Alyssa Phillips, CScD, OTR/L (OR), is an assistant professor and clinical education coordinator in the School of Occupational Therapy at Pacific University in Hillsboro, Oregon, where

she teaches courses on anatomy, kinesiology, and adult physical disability. She holds a master's degree in occupational therapy and a Clinical Science Doctorate with a focus on knowledge translation and adolescent pain management. With a clinical background in chronic pain and symptom management in industrial, upper extremity, and neurological populations, Phillips has been an occupational therapy practitioner for over six years and transitioned to full-time academic in 2022. Her scholarship focuses on developing wellness curriculum, pain management, and neurodiversity-affirming practice. Phillips' work in teaching and her scholarship aims to support students in applying their didactic knowledge and clinical experiences to occupational therapy practice and client-centered care through empathy, authenticity, and evidence-informed intervention.



Samia Rafeedie, OTD, OTR/L, BCPR, CBIS, is the director of the Professional Program in Occupational Therapy at the University of Southern California (USC), director of health and safety, and

associate professor of clinical occupational therapy. She has been on the faculty since 2008 and has primarily taught adult physical rehabilitation and kinesiology. technology professional.




