- **Individual Session Tickets.** When you check in at the Conference Registration Counter, you will receive a blue ticket imprinted with your name on it for every session and activity for which you are registered. The room monitor will collect the tickets as you enter every session and activity room. If the room monitor does not collect your ticket, please seek them out. These tickets are maintained at the OTAC office as verification of your attendance.

Movie Night: The Path Forward:
Remembering Willowbrook (.5 PDUs)

A historical exposé of Willowbrook State School, a state supported institution for children and adults with developmental disabilities

Join us for the screening of this powerful documentary that sparked a national reckoning over the treatment of people with developmental disabilities in institutional care. At the time, Willowbrook State School was the largest institution of its kind housing over 6,000 residents. In 1972, Geraldo Rivera exposed the overcrowding and unsanitary conditions and reported how the children and adults were deprived of stimulation, basic human care, and their human dignity. This Emmy-winning documentary shares the lived experience of Willowbrook through the voices of former residents, staff, and journalists. This is a reflection on the lessons learned, a testament of positive change through advocacy, a celebration of inclusion, and the ongoing work towards full community integration for people with disabilities. This documentary raises questions every occupational therapy practitioner should be asking themselves regarding institutional environments, legislative and policy changes, ethical violations, and advocacy. Willowbrook catalyzed the deinstitutionalization movement, community-based care models, and the disability rights legislation that shaped the occupational therapy profession we practice today.

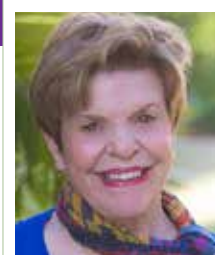

TOP 10 PASADENA AWESOME ACTIVITIES

1. **Stroll Old Pasadena:** Explore this highly walkable, 22-block historic district. Wander along Colorado Boulevard (historic Route 66) to discover boutiques, courtyards, and diverse dining housed in turn-of-the-century brick buildings.
2. **Admire the Huntington Library, Art Museum, and Botanical Gardens:** Just south in San Marino, this sprawling 120-acre estate features world-class art galleries, a rare Gutenberg Bible, and stunning themed botanical sections like the Japanese and Desert Gardens.
3. **Tour the Norton Simon Museum:** Famous for its incredible private art collection, this museum holds European masterpieces from artists like Degas, Picasso, and Van Gogh, as well as a beautiful sculpture garden.
4. **Visit the Gamble House:** A stunning masterpiece of the American Arts and Crafts movement. Designed in 1908 by architects Charles and Henry Greene, it offers guided tours showcasing its gorgeous woodwork and handcrafted details. From the movie *Back to the Future* fame.
5. **Hike Eaton Canyon:** Escape into nature at the base of the mountains. The 3.5-mile roundtrip Eaton Canyon Trail features a rewarding, 40-foot seasonal waterfall.
6. **Find Joy at the Kidspace Children's Museum:** Enjoy kid-driven experiences inspiring them to become joyful, active learners.
7. **Marvel at the Pasadena City Hall Architecture:** A marvel of 1920s architecture, this iconic landmark features a striking, 200-foot dome, beautiful Spanish-Renaissance influences, and a lush, tree-lined central courtyard.
8. **Relax in the Arlington Garden:** A peaceful, community-built urban retreat. This free, 3-acre garden is filled with olive trees, citrus groves, and cozy seating, making it a perfect spot to relax or have a picnic.
9. **Catch a Show at the Pasadena Playhouse:** Open since 1925, this historic State Theatre of California hosts high-quality theatrical productions, musicals, and community events.
10. **Take in the Views at Colorado Street Bridge:** Take in the breathtaking views from this historic 1913 arched bridge. Its Beaux-Arts lampposts and dramatic arches make it a local favorite for sunset strolls.

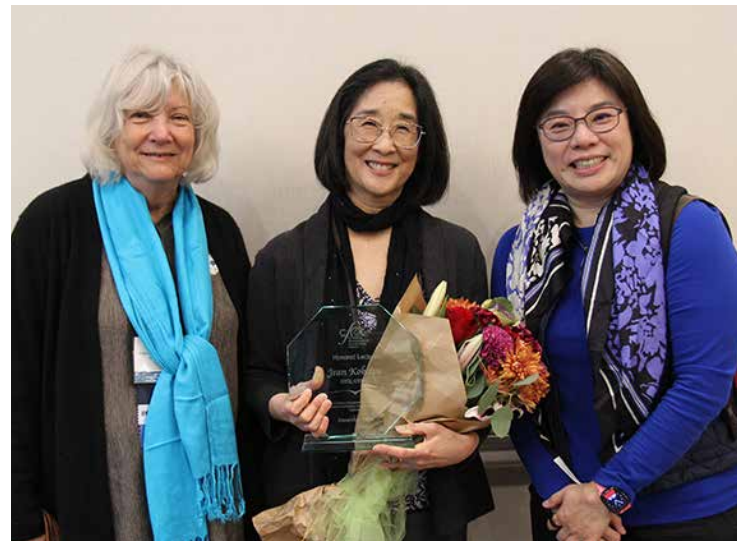

Engaging with these questions has led him to the belief that the assessment and management of functional cognition is an important opportunity for the occupational therapy profession. *Dr. Giles was an AOTA Eleanor Clarke Slagle Lectureship Awardee.*

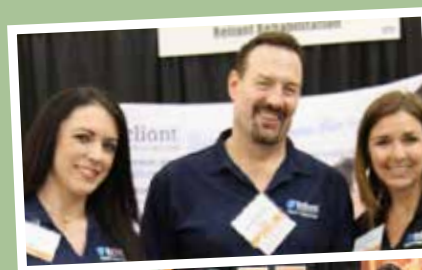

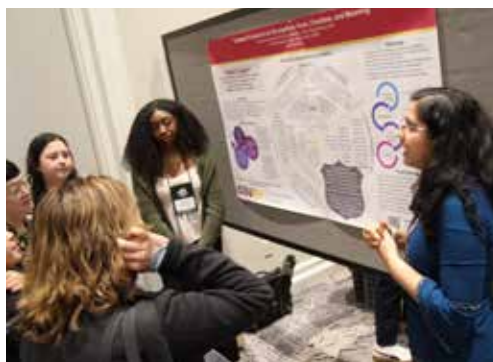

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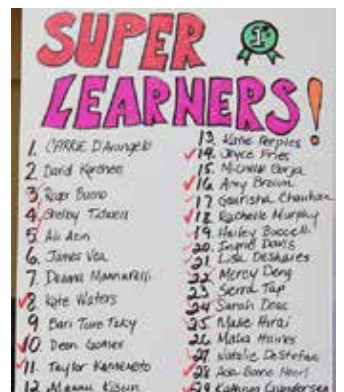
