Occupational Therapy's Distinct Value in Working with Patients Post-op Vaginoplasty and Creating a Culturally Humble Environment

The presenters will review background of practitioners working in this setting, recommend resources and pathways for clinicians interested in working in the NICU, and provide guidance on materials for practitioners new to this advanced area of practice.

Cruz worked closely with the interdisciplinary team to develop post-op protocol for OT and PT to use when seeing this population post operatively.

He is a Safe Patient Handling Champion as well and especially enjoys tinkering with old equipment and trialing new equipment in this role. Carolyn Ibrahim, OTR/L,

CNT, CIMI, CLC, is an occupational therapy practitioner and Certified Neonatal Therapist (CNT) working in a Level III NICU in Santa Barbara. As the NICU she works in is part of an adult hospital, she has spent the last few years establishing competencies

and training for practitioners looking to transition from adults to pediatrics. Ibrahim is also working towards completing her PhD. additional certification in NDT and sensory integration, various infant assessments, infant massage and Trauma Informed Professionals. In addition to hospital work, Miller has taught at Eastern Washington University in OT, PT, and ST programs and at the community college for occupational therapy assistant and physical therapy assistant programs. Miller has taught nationally for PESI and internationally through Medical Teams International and at the European Occupational Therapy Consortium for Higher Education. She has articles published in American Journal of Occupational Therapy and Neonatal Network. She has updated two chapters in a pediatric textbook for occupational therapy assistants which was published in 2021. Miller is on the Neonatal Therapy Certification Board which developed neonatal therapy certification for rehabilitation professionals.
