OTs in the ICU: Our Role in Organ Transplantation Nicolette Longo, MS, OTR/L

The needs of the organ transplant patient population are diverse and continue to evolve as there is an expansion in donor pools, improved mortality rate, and advancements in multi-organ transplantation. Occupational therapy practitioners (OTP) are tasked with implementing evidenced-based measures to evaluate and treat patients undergoing organ transplantation in the ICU setting. This presentation will highlight the OTP's role on the interdisciplinary team for the transplant patient and discuss evidenced-based assessments and how they are used to measure functional progression and participation in self-care. Additionally, this presentation will emphasize case studies and goal setting across the ICU and acute level of care.

orthopedic service line and assists with running the same day spine program. She mentors new students and residents and assists with other multidisciplinary programs.



Don Gordon, PhD, OTR/L, has been studying behavior for more than 30 years in an ongoing effort to understand how people find meaning in life. Gordon graduated from the University of Southern California with an MA in occupational therapy in 1994.

He worked in psychiatry, physical rehabilitation, and acute care while engaging in his doctoral studies in occupational science, completing his PhD in 2002. Gordon's work in a range of settings has provided him

with a unique experiential background to understand the intersection of the world of mental health with physical disabilities practice. He has also taught a wide variety of classes for the University of Southern California Department of Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy. Gordon is currently on the faculty at the University of Southern California department of Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy where he teaches and works in acute care.



Seth D. Herman, MD, is a physiatrist with a subspeciality in brain injury medicine. He is currently the Brain Injury Medical Director of California Rehabilitation Institute which is a joint venture of Cedars-Sinai Hospital System and

UCLA. Prior to taking on this position, he was director of Brain Injury Medicine Fellowship at Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital within the Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at Harvard Medical School. He obtained his medical degree at Penn State and residency training at Shirley Ryan Ability Ability/Formerly known as Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago/Northwestern Medical School. Herman's research and clinical interests are focused on the treatment and improvement of functional outcomes of those who suffered traumatic and acquired brain injuries as well as functional neurological disorders. He is interested in the evaluation and management of potential medical barriers that can impair functional outcomes such as poor sleep, pain, spasticity, neuroendocrine dysfunction, neurobehavioral, cognitive, physical and emotional deficits. As a trained physiatrist, he has the expertise to understand the whole patient and the role of body system/structure deficits and impact on activity and participation.

Longo's current clinical and research interests include patient's undergoing multi-organ transplantation, early mobilization, and engagement for patients in the ICU, and occupational therapy for patients following surgical reconstruction from head and neck related malignancies. She enjoys incorporating interdisciplinary concepts to enhance her own clinical practice.



Sharon Pavlovich, EdD, COTA/L, is an assistant professor in the profession of occupational therapy; past president for the California Board of Occupational Therapy; and Harvard Macy Scholar. She is the author of the PSQ (Pavlovich Sexuality Questionnaire) and has research and teaching interests

in leadership, advocacy, DEI, and LGBTQA+ health and inclusive spaces.

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
