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About Our Presenters



Jeni Dulek, OTD, OTR/L, is an assistant professor in the School of Occupational Therapy at Pacific University. She has been an occupational therapy practitioner for 23 years specializing in

psychosocial practice and has been in full-time academic roles for the past nine years. Her teaching practices center on holistic care and concern for students, including methods that support belonging and mattering and involve students as partners in their learning and professional growth. Dulek has researched student resistance and has presented extensively on related topics such as advising, student belonging, and Universal Design for Learning, all which support student learning and may decrease resistance.



Michelle Gorenberg, OTD, OTR/L, is a clinical associate professor at the Institute for Occupational Therapy Education at Widener University. She has been a practicing occupational therapy practitioner for

the past 37 years, specializing in pediatric practice. Gorenberg has been an academic educator for the past 15 years and is honored to have received the AOTA's Distinguished Educator Award for 2023. Her teaching practices center on creating inclusive learning communities that support students' curiosity, risk-taking, and growth.



Linsey Grunes, OTD, OTR/L, was born in the United States but raised in Europe and Hong Kong. She completed her undergraduate, master's, and clinical doctorate degrees at the

University of Southern California. She is now an assistant professor of clinical occupational therapy, providing instruction in the foundations of pediatric occupational therapy practice and school-based practice and participating in research projects for the USC Chan Division's Sensory Integration, Engagement, and Family Life Initiative. Grunes has more than 10 years of clinical experience in various pediatric settings and has served in leadership roles mentoring clinicians, developing and implementing programs, and coordinating fieldwork placements. She has extensive experience and additional training in sensory integration, pediatric and perinatal mental health, and promoting social and community engagement for children and families. Her doctoral work focused on program evaluation and quality improvement for group social skills programming.



Janet Gunter, OTD, OTR/L, is a clinical associate professor of occupational therapy. She has worked for more than 25 years as a pediatric occupational therapy practitioner, and specializes in working

with children with autism spectrum disorder, neuromotor disorders, and feeding and oral-motor difficulties and their families. She is also a co-owner and director of clinical operations at Therapy West, Inc., where she supports both administrative and therapeutic staff and enjoys mentoring practitioners in culturally humble care.

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
Jennifer Jones, OTD, OTR/L, BCP, is an assistant professor of clinical occupational therapy at the University of Southern California (USC) and appointed faculty at the USC University Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities at Children's Hospital Los Angeles.

Jones has over 15 years of pediatric experience working in homes, schools, clinics, and community settings with advanced training in sensory integration and feeding disorders. She is passionate about including families in intervention and providing client-centered and culturally humble care.



Merry Lee, OTD, OTR/L, received a Master of Arts in occupational therapy and an Occupational Therapy Doctorate from the University of Southern California. She also graduated from UC Davis with a BS in exercise biology and a BA in psychology.

Lee is originally from San Francisco and moved to the Los Angeles region for occupational therapy school. She currently works at Momentum Pediatric Therapy Network and is an adjunct assistant professor of clinical occupational therapy at the University of Southern California (USC), co-teaching the pediatrics immersion course and online USC Chan sensory integration continuing education certificate courses. Lee is certified in the Sensory Integration and Praxis Tests (SIPT), and has received advanced practice certification in Swallowing Assessment, Evaluation, or Intervention from the California Board of Occupational Therapy.



Ling Yu (Elena) Meng, OTD, OTR/L, BCP, earned a Bachelor of Science and a Master of Science in occupational therapy from McGill University in Montreal, Canada, prior to completing a Post-Professional Doctor of Occupational Therapy

(OTD) at the University of Southern California (USC). Both during her doctoral residency and now as a faculty member, Meng has worked closely with the *China Initiative* in supporting the dual-degree program of USC Chan with the Peking University Health Science Center (PKUHSC). Her current work focuses on assisting with the curriculum development and cultural adaptation of the dual-degree program and mentoring the PKUHSC-USC dual-degree students. Meng also teaches the pediatric practice immersion course in the Entry-Level Professional Master's Program at USC. She has trained at pediatric institutions internationally, including the National Rehabilitation Center for Children with Disabilities in Tokyo, Japan, the Montreal Children's Hospital in Montreal, Canada, and Pediatric Therapy Network in Torrance, California. She has completed the USC Chan Sensory Integration Continuing Education Certificate Program with hands-on clinical training (OT 610). Meng has practiced as an occupational therapy practitioner, providing pediatric clinic-based, school-based, in-home early intervention, and telehealth services.



Tessa Milman, OTD, OTR/L, teaches mental health, clinical reasoning, and qualitative research in the Chan Division of Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy at USC, utilizing team-based learning and other learner-centered pedagogies. Her

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
courses incorporate diverse perspectives and critical theories to support occupational therapy students to become culturally humble practitioners who care deeply about lived experiences and embody person-centered and trauma-informed approaches. Milman is passionate about integrating lived experience with academic knowledge within teaching and practice and embedding justice, equity, diversity, and inclusion into occupational therapy practice and curriculum. She has practiced and supervised students in pediatric and adult mental health settings.



Myka Persson, OTD, OTR/L, is the program director for the MSOT program at Stanbridge University in Irvine, CA. She has over 10 years of experience teaching occupational therapy and pre-occupational therapy students. Her primary, former clinical background is in Lifestyle Redesign®.



Samia Rafeedie, OTD, OTR/L, BCPR, CBIS, is the director of the professional program in occupational therapy at the University of Southern California (USC) and associate professor of clinical occupational therapy. She has been on the faculty since 2008 and has primarily taught adult physical rehabilitation and kinesiology. Rafeedie has been an occupational therapy practitioner for 21 years, with additional practice interests in productive aging and geriatrics, pedagogy and higher education, mentorship, and volunteerism.



Candace Ro, MA, OTR/L, is a doctoral student at the University of Southern California (USC). She received a master's in occupational therapy from USC as well as a bachelor's in health and human sciences with minors in occupational science and narrative structure.
